#### **EDITORIAL**



(CEVES)

Dear readers,

I am pleased to present the fifth issue of the bulletin of the platform for public dialogue «SDGs for ALL« Platform, with a summary of current events on our platform, which aims to establish a comprehensive dialogue on the importance of the 2030 Agenda and bring Serbia closer to achieving its goals.

On our platform, the CEVES Centre for Advanced Economic Studies

works with six local organizations, and with one of them, the Timok Youth Center in Zajecar, it jointly manages the platform's economic pillar. The goals we are working on are: Decent work and economic growth (8), Industry, innovation and infrastructure (9), Reducing inequalities (10), Sustainable cities and communities (11) and Peace, justice and strong institutions (16).

To implement these goals, but also most of the remaining goals, we believe that a more rapid development of the Serbian economy is

necessary, and above all of its dominant factor - small and medium enterprises (SMEs). The largest part of the Serbian economy - as much as 99.8% - are SMEs, which create 60% of the added value, 66% of employment and 45% of exports.

Unlike foreign investment, which often attracts much more attention but usually requires land and large reservoirs of available labour (sometimes thousands of staff), SMEs are able to reach every pore of

society and every part of Serbia, even those sparsely populated. In this

way, SMEs contribute to the key principle of the 2030 Agenda – not to leave anyone out of development. They also achieve most of the goals of the 2030 Agenda, in particular that of increasing decent employment and reducing poverty and inequality.

Over the past three decades, despite many challenges, several hundred very successful SMEs have emerged in Serbia, some of which are almost European niche leaders. These companies are also found in sectors

where Serbia has a competitive advantage through its heritage, such

as food products, special machines and tools, and metal products; but also in some "more modern" industries such as the production of medical devices and equipment, electrical and optical products, and software and hardware IT solutions.

The challenge we would like to highlight lies in the fact that there could

be many more such companies, while at the same time the "use" of existing SMEs is insufficient. Our analysis shows that the SME sector is unusually fragmented and has developed in isolation in the past, without cooperation or a sufficient level of support. And while this trait is sometimes an advantage, since it brings greater flexibility and less reliance on others, it can become a burden at times when growth is necessary and possible. Progress then requires connection, not only among companies, but also between companies and educational and development institutions and organizations. Connectivity is important because SMEs often have insufficient capacity to overcome development challenges on their own.

For a little over two years, CEVES has been leading and encouraging

dialogue with and among key companies in Serbia on their development

needs and the development of Serbian industry. So far we have discussed existing and necessary initiatives, the situation on the labour market and, of course, cooperation. One important partner so far has been the Development Agency of Serbia. Through these dialogues, we strive to identify and support the launch of initiatives that will contribute to realizing this vision by 2030, and which can best be summed up in the desire to provide a dignified life and job for all. The dialogues so far have shown that, although there is potential in Serbia, there is not enough openness nor culture of cooperation and connections. We often hear from businesspeople that they do not even know similar entrepreneurs or businesspeople from their neighbourhood. Without knowledge of other market players and openness to cooperation, one cannot expect associations to occur spontaneously. CEVES is interested in this situation and will continue to make efforts

to change it. Our idea is to promote the collective identity and strength of local industry and show it what it can do if it joins forces, uses opportunities from foreign and local funds and follows global economic trends. We also want to continuously remind the state of the importance of support for SMEs, and support initiatives to eradicate bad institutional practices and inappropriate legal solutions. In this sense, our goal is for one of the results of our dialogues to be a contribution to the new SME strategy.

Finally, at the MIND Park in Kragujevac in early June, we are preparing


where we will provide an opportunity for established and successful domestic SMEs to present themselves and their achievements, their contributions to the community and sustainable development. to get to know each other better and help us to jointly shape the initiatives we will work on in the future. As part of all these activities, we want to point out the importance of SMEs in Serbia, to promote joint strength and emphasize that companies that make up the healthiest tissue of our development should network and cooperate and that their voice should be heard louder.

The example of the Platform itself indicates not only the importance, but also the need for joint action and involvement of a wide range of

2021, the Local Development Plan of the Municipality of Priboj for


the period from 2022 to 2028 was adopted. "SDGs for All" Platform

the Sustainable Development Goals. The workshop was attended


by local companies from Sombor, Apatin and the surrounding

As it was pointed out at the panel, one of the key issues is that Serbia does not have a comprehensive development plan at the national level. This means that the country's strategic development priorities are not determined by a comprehensive public development policy, although this is a legal obligation under the Planning System Law. It was emphasized that in the absence of consistent national environmental policies and priorities, the recent opening of negotiating chapter

and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

The participants emphasized that the issue of the balance between

environmental protection, on one hand, and overall economic and

social development, on the other, is at the core of the 2030 Agenda

policies and priorities, the recent opening of negotiating chapter 27 could be a great opportunity, which should be accompanied by accelerating the process of Serbia's European integration. In conclusion, the panel participants agreed that the environment is certainly a priority of the highest level, which through the concept of sustainable development, can be harmonized with society's overall need to progress.

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
